Then, late this summer, scaffolding was erected in the southwest corner of the sanctuary to repair the water-damaged wall from a number of years ago. Now, later this month, we will have scaffolding erected along the south side of the sanctuary for the removal of the 10 Tiffany windows that will be restored. In addition, there will be a sidewalk bridge on 93rd street that will remain up for the duration of the restoration project (12-18 months).

We've complained a lot about it the last few years, but this time we have a different attitude – we will regard the new scaffolding that will be both inside and outside of our church this fall as a sign of forward movement, progress and the beginning of a project the congregation has hoped could happen for many years!

Spiritual scaffolding...ever considered what that is in your life?

Note on Bequest and Tiffany Project

By the time you receive this newsletter, Advent will have had a very important Special Congregational Meeting on September 27. At that meeting, we will have addressed both the final contract for restoration of the 10 Tiffany windows on the south side of the sanctuary and the Council recommendation for allocation of the Moeller bequest. The leadership of our congregation has been working on both of these items for almost 3 years, although they were unrelated to each other. We had begun visioning work on the Tiffany restoration before we had any knowledge that the bequest was forthcoming.

We have known the Tiffany windows in the sanctuary were in need of restoration for many years. It has been a concern of the congregation for decades. In the fall of 2006, when Hans Kriefall was still working in Frankfurt, Germany, I asked if he would be willing to lead up a Tiffany campaign to evaluate all of the windows in the sanctuary and both plan and implement a campaign leading to their restoration. He graciously agreed, as Hans so often does, and began working on the campaign when he returned to New York. The Tiffany Task Force created campaign materials, we engaged Kairos fundraising consultant, Glenn Schoonover, and pledges were made on Palm Sunday, 2008 for a three-year campaign. We are currently in year two of the campaign.

Little did we know when we began the Tiffany campaign that a bequest that had almost become an urban legend in our church would materialize. Jacob Moeller, whose mother was a member of Advent in the 1930's, designated Advent to be one of three entities to receive the proceeds of a non-marital trust upon the death of his wife. Jacob Moeller died in the late 1940's; Jacob's wife died in January, 2007.

I want to thank everyone who has helped us work through these two important items – one expected and the other unexpected. We look forward to being able to move forward in ministry together and onto new things!! Most importantly, we want to serve God and be good stewards of all the resources with which we have been so graciously blessed. Grace can be both expected and unexpected. This convergence of items in our ministry has helped open our eyes to the mysterious (and sometimes humorous) ways in which God works.

The council nominating committee will be meeting throughout the autumn to prepare for the congregational meeting in January. We anticipate several openings on the council. News on Mission Support from Karen Cantrell

As mentioned in last month's newsletter, in keeping with Advent's mission to fund causes outside our walls, donations were sent to two international ministries, one national, and two local. The breakdowns are below along with excerpts from letters of thanks we received from the recipients. (The odd amounts of money derive from the percentage formula used to determine the donations.)

El Salvador: \$479

Phyllis Johnson, El Salvador Funds Coordinator, thanked Advent for its continued and growing support of the ministry in El Salvador. Advent's funds went directly to Bishop Gomez, who oversees a range of charitable activities, including support for Lutheran pastors who mostly receive no salaries, also for church buildings, and free dental care.

Global Mission Support (Japan): \$479

As the Rev. Twila Schock, Director, wrote: "Like the loaves and fish, Jesus blesses and multiplies our gifts to make a world of difference. That's good news!"

Extraordinary Lutheran Ministries (ELM): \$958

Amalia Vagts, Executive Director, said that while the historic votes taken by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America to open their roster to people who are in same-sex relationships brought much joy, "There is still much work for ELM during this time of implementation and transition." Advent will be kept informed as ELM decides what their role and ministry will be in light of the ELCA's votes. See www.elm.org for more details.

Transfiguration Lutheran Church, Bronx, NY: \$1,427

In his letter of thanks, Pastor Paul Block said the timing was "divinely inspired" because the Synod office's financial crisis had kept their mission support check from coming! He also offered to come to Advent to thank us personally! We will welcome Pastor Block at a service in 2010!

West Side Campaign Against Hunger: \$1,437

The West Side Campaign Against Hunger has an Open Door Policy, which means that they turn no one away. As a result, in July, they provided 71,577 meals to 7,953 people – a 19 percent increase over September 2008. Doreen Wohl, Executive Director, invites Advent's congregation and staff to tour their facility in order to learn more about this organization right down the street that is working to meet the challenge of hunger in New York, especially during this economic downturn and time of rising unemployment.

Voices of Praise, with a history of Contemporary Christian Music from Emily Ballentine

Contemporary Christian Music, or CCM, has its roots in what is known as the “Jesus Movement” of the 1960’s and 1970’s. The “Jesus Movement” was revivalist in nature and ran parallel to the hippie counterculture during the same time period. Many popular musicians of the day converted to Christianity and began writing Christian lyrics for their songs. This new style of music was first referred to as “Jesus Music,” but by the 1980’s that term had fallen out of use and the broader term Contemporary Christian Music was adopted as the name for the new genre. Pioneers of this genre include bands such as Petra and 2nd Chapter of Acts. Today, the CCM genre is represented by groups such as Jars of Clay, the Newsboys, and Casting Crowns, as well as individuals like Stephen Curtis Chapman, Twila Paris and Chris Tomlin.

CCM has grown to include many styles of music from Southern gospel and rock n’ roll, to heavy metal and rap. Perhaps the biggest link to connect all of these styles of music is that they all speak to a very personal relationship with Jesus Christ in the midst of trying and stressful times in the world. We all need to feel that God is present in our lives and in the world, that God is with us during times of war and social injustice, and that Jesus walks with us during personal struggles. Contemporary Christian Music is an important way for us as God’s people to connect with our faith and renew our commitment to Christian life.

As director of Voices of Praise, and on behalf of all our members, we are privileged to bring the music of contemporary Christian artists to our worship services each week. We feel blessed to be able to share this gift of music with you, and we pray that our voices will be a channel of peace and love for all Jesus’ disciples.

On Reformation Sunday, October 25, Voices of Praise will be singing an original song entitled “On Faith Alone.” This song was inspired by the movie “Luther,” which was released in 2003. The text speaks of Luther’s great conviction that we are saved by faith alone, through God’s great mercy, and not only by what we say or do.

Calling the Young Women of Advent!

If you are a young woman (18 to early 30's), you are invited to participate in a special study group this fall. We will study the connections between faith and action, exploring the issue of obstetric fistula. This might sound like a strange topic but, to thousands of women throughout the less-developed parts of the world, it's a very serious thing indeed.

Obstetric Fistula is a condition that results from a long, obstructed labor, resulting in an opening ("fistula") between the bladder and rectum and/or vagina. It is common in areas where access to medical care, especially good gynecological care, is poor. Obstetric Fistula used to be a huge problem in the US and other now "developed" countries, and is still a problem in areas like sub-Saharan Africa and Southeast Asia.

This is a pilot curriculum that we will be helping to evaluate and develop for the National Council of Churches. We will meet four times this fall for 1 ½ hours each meeting. The Power of Prayer by Kathleen Carpenter

One of the few times you can induce silence in a group of Adventians is to ask someone to pray. A hush will immediately fall over the crowd and, after a few minutes of silence, someone will pipe up that they would but they don't know how. Someone else will mention a friend of theirs (often a Baptist) who really knows how to pray and whom they admire for this ability. A third person will opine that they wish they knew how to pray but have never been able to learn. True, Lutherans have a reputation of being the "frozen chosen" but this inability to pray and, let's face it, unwillingness to try, is kind of strange. After all, we at Advent are not all of Nordic origin so we can't all blame it on the buttoned-down culture of the colder climes.

I confess that for many years I was one of those who stared at the floor while the group leader asked someone to offer up a prayer. I was nervous that I would stumble over the words, that I would not wax eloquent enough to hold the attention of the group (let alone God!), that I might reveal too much of myself or of others, or, worst of all, that I might become emotional. And I remembered Jesus' words about the hypocrite who stands in the middle of the synagogue calling attention to himself by loudly praying.

This problem is not confined to those of us who worship at Advent, of course. The New York Times magazine of September 20 has an entire article devoted to the subject. The title? "Is There a Right Way to Pray?" One of the people interviewed for the article says that prayer "requires mastering both theory and technique" which only reinforces the idea that there is a "right" way to pray. A rabbi says that prayers fall into four categories: "Gimme! Thanks! Oops! And Wow!" The writer ends his article with a story about encountering a group of children from a Berkeley Springs, West Virginia Assembly of God. Although the writer (Zev Chafets) does not think he will ever be a praying man, should he become one, he'd like to be like these children who offer "Straight-up Gimme(s)!" for people in their lives who really need help.

So, is there a right way to pray? Despite all the various methods that we have been taught, I'd like to think not. Surely the God who invited us to share Creation with Him and who was depicted in early Scripture as someone who would drop by in the evening for a walk and chat, surely that God ("Abba" or "Daddy") would be open to some relaxed, laid-back, or even intense conversation. Like a good friend you've not talked to in awhile, God is probably pleased just to hear from you! So here's a challenge: the next time someone says "Who would like to close us in prayer?" take a deep breath and share a thought or two with the One who loves you best!
